

Epic Norwegian Northern Lights Trip December 2025

Saturday, December 20, 2025

NYC to Norway

We got up around 8:30am, Arianna made blueberry muffins and made me a great egg sandwich. We went to Target for supplies and my favorite deli for Philly cheesesteak. It took about an hour to get to Newark Airport. I had 3 great experiences to set the tone for a fabulous trip. First, even though the TSA officer looked mean, she turned out to be very pleasant and wished us a happy holiday. I met a dad with his son, both with ginger colored hair, I told him that only 2% of the population is ginger. He did not know that...and was impressed that I did. I then met a sweet girl who was going to a ski camp in Sweden. Our seat (Row 40 out of 50) was okay during the 7.5 hour trip to Oslo where we arrived at 8am.

Sunday, December 21, 2025

Tromsø

Tromsø is actually pronounced Trumzuh. It is spelled TROMSØ and is pronounced like U sound as in burn. In Norway, their greeting is Hi, Hi. Their form of currency is NOK (Norwegian Krona) and the exchange rate is about 1/10. So, a Coke is \$4.90, about 490 NOK. They do not have Diet Coke in Norway. Sadly, I had to do without it for about 10 days. The flight from Oslo to Tromsø was 2 hours, we got there at 1:30pm and the sun set at 1:15pm. Four months out of the year, the sun rises at 9:30am and sets 3 hours later. It was bizarre being outside during the day in total darkness. During our 3 days in Tromsø, it was between 32-37°F. Our Airbnb in Tromsø was big, comfortable and very Nordic with heated floors. We had dinner at a small café, a 10 minute walk from our AirBnB. Our first trek for the Northern Lights was 1.5 hours from Tromsø. At first we didn't see anything but then the universe shined upon us, the clouds broke, the rain stopped and we saw the magnificent light show. The best part cannot be described, it must be experienced, because our eyes don't see northern lights like a camera. We had a campfire on the snow where we ate freeze-dried chicken curry. In addition to our own clothes, they gave us boots and a puffy jumper that looked like a mechanic's uniform. We took many pictures that started out as colorless blobs in the sky, but the camera shows the awesome lights in green, blue, gray color. We got back at 130am.

Monday, December 22, 2025

Tromsø

We slept until 9:30am and Arianna made breakfast. Then we all went to the gym, yes, on vacay. We walked around the city center, about 5 miles. We got Chase his much appreciated sweater from Dale of Norway. So glad he liked it. We all tried reindeer, whale and moose sausage. Yeah, no thank you. They have shops called 7/23 which is just like our 7-Eleven, open from 7am to 11pm. We then headed out with Irene, our guide from Spain and Volchok, our driver from Poland, for our second adventure to the northern lights. This included a 2.5 hour trek into Finland, just shy of where [Norway, Finland & Sweden converge geographically](#). It was colder 29°F, dryer and clearer. We had a camp fire on frozen [Lake Kilpisjärvi](#). We also drank a warm hot drink, a Norwegian specialty [Black Currant](#), which was actually banned in the US for over 100 years. We got back to the Airbnb at about 2:30am.

Tromsø

We headed out at 10am and stopped at [Ohal & Mac Brewery](#), for beer and reindeer hot dogs. I don't drink beer and the hotdog sucked, but it was the oldest brewery in Norway. We walked downtown and sent postcards to Karen, Chase's former au pair and Pablo in Escondido. We went to a bakery and were told in no uncertain terms to take off our spikes, removing and putting them back on was an ordeal but we complied. However, I was really angry when I saw others who flagrantly disobeyed the rules and kept their spikes on. I went to the clerk and told them that any/all rules should be complied with by EVERYONE. I agree the spikes (\$15) were a smart buy and they really did work well in the snow, because there was so much snow, ice and sleet, but they were very difficult to put on. We went to the northernmost McDonald's. Then on to [Pust Sauna/Polar Plunge](#). Afsar, Arianna & Chase did it 3 times, I did not but rather played photographer for all those who did. We went to [Magic ICE](#), an ice bar, where 3 rooms were ice, with reindeer skins on benches, ice sculptures and a drink served in an ice cup. It was \$120 for a 15 minute stay...we say we were tourist trapped on this, but we went to say we had gone. After our 2 previous treks to the lights, turns out the best night for the Auroras was the last night, which was free. Arianna took a great video of the dancing lights; we saw them for at least an hour as we were walking around town looking for a place to eat and found [Fullsteam](#). Arianna wanted a reindeer burger, but alas they were out. Chase had reindeer stew, Afsar and I shared a vegetable stew. We went to a midnight concert at [Tromsø Cathedral](#). Afsar & Arianna fell asleep and we took Uber home because it was raining, snowing and 32°F.



On our walk we saw a city lake, some unusual trees called Pollarded Plane Trees and the Fish Market all lit up in red. The Bryggen Wharf was established in about 1360AD. The timber wharves and warehouses are now a UNESCO site. We went to the [Cross Church](#), which was very cool, the priest and community were very welcoming. They had dinner for anyone who wanted to come, which really embraced the spirit of Christmas. We had dinner at [Leela, an Indian restaurant](#) and met this totally cool, waiter who was from Crete in Greece. He let us in without reservations, since there were a lot of places that were all reserved. There was no snow and it was 33°F.



Thursday, December 25, 2025

Bergen

Christmas morning, the hotel had a great breakfast bar with tons of food, including bagels and lox, caviar, bread, potatoes, pancakes, oatmeal, meat, eggs, bacon and all kinds of salads. Afterwards we went to [St. Mary's Church](#), built in the mid-12th century. We took the [Fløibanen](#) funicular to [Mt. Fløyen](#), approximately 1,050 feet above the city, for a spectacular view. We stopped at [Amundsen Whiskey Bar](#) (largest in Norway with hundreds of different kinds of Whiskey) because Chase & Afsar love Whiskey. Perhaps it is an occupational hazard but I am fascinated by death, graves and events surrounding them, so because it was so close, we went to the [Assistentkirkegården](#), the graveyard behind Zander K, established in 1837. One grave was disturbed, which was weird because these graves are from the 1800s. We had dinner at the hotel, [Matbaren](#), where we had a lively conversation. We went to bed at 9:30pm because we were all exhausted.


